Because the Vernal Full Moon does not occur on the same date in the calendar until 19 years have passed, the date of the Easter festival is continually changing from one year to the next. But it is not just the Moon that causes this change, it is our experience of the festival itself that changes, ideally by deepening and maturing. In his *Cycle of the Year* lectures of 1923 (Dornach, Mar. 30-Apr. 4), Rudolf Steiner describes how we can become "festival creating" by *thinking with* the course of the year, such that we can find the festival not merely by looking at a calendar or falling back on tradition, but by knowing where the Earth is, and where we are, in relation to the cosmos.

Included in this talk will be a consideration of the events of the Holy Week, day by day; how these events relate to the planets that lend their names to the days of the week; and how these events culminate in the sayings from the Cross on Good Friday, as a way to awaken to how we turn from the lunar revelations to the sun revelations that take place at this time of year.

As a global advocate for starry skies, Mary led the team that established the 9th International Dark Sky Park in the world in 2011, which later led to the State of Michigan protecting 35,000 acres of state land for its natural darkness.
